
Inades-Formation Secures a Grant to Establish Agroforestry Training Centre

VI AGROFORESTRY, renowned Swedish organization with expertise in agroforestry, has **Inades-Formation** awarded Tanzania (IFTz) a prestigious grant that will allow IFTz to establish a pioneering Dryland Agroforestry Training Centre in Dodoma region, Tanzania. This remarkable initiative aims sustainable promote farming practices, combat climate change, and empower communities to thrive in arid environments.

Dodoma region, characterized by low rainfall and arid conditions, often suffer from desertification, erosion, and reduced productivity. agricultural Agroforestry, a practice that combines tree cultivation with agriculture, offers a sustainable solution to combat challenges. By integrating trees farming systems, agroforestry helps improve soil fertility, conserve water, protect against wind erosion.

Additionally, it provides valuable ecosystem services, such as carbon sequestration and biodiversity conservation. IFTz recognizes the potential of agroforestry to transform dryland landscapes and enhance the livelihoods of local communities.

IFTz has been a frontrunner in promoting sustainable agriculture and rural development across Tanzania. With a strong focus on capacity building and knowledge sharing, the organization has empowered countless farmers with innovative techniques and practices.



By partnering with Vi Agroforestry, IFTz aims to further expand its impact and create a legacy through the establishment of the Agroforestry Training Centre.



The centre to be called "Inades-Formation Dryland Agroforestry Training Centre (IFDATC)," made possible by the Vi Agroforestry grant of SEK 500,000, will serve as a hub for knowledge exchange, training, and research in agroforestry practices tailored to dryland environments.

The IFTz Managing Director Mbarwa Kivuyo says: "Our centre aims to equip farmers, extension workers, and policymakers with the necessary skills and knowledge to implement sustainable agroforestry systems."

Through practical demonstrations, workshops, and seminars, participants will learn about tree species selection, water management, erosion control, and income diversification. This comprehensive training will enable communities to build resilience, restore degraded landscapes, and improve their livelihoods in the face of climate change and environmental degradation.

Join the Seeds of Change in Chemba District

IN THE heart of Chemba District, Dodoma region, an inspiring initiative is taking root – the promotion and establishment of a community local seeds bank for conservation of agrobiodiversity by Inades-Formation Tanzania (IFTz). This pilot project is supported by Inades-Formation International and financed by Bread for the World (BftW) and the Basque Agency for

Development Cooperation (ABCD), aims to strengthen traditional seed system that are resistant to climate change and to conserve agribiodiversity through promotion of community seed banks in Chemba District.

Seeds are the fundamental basis of agriculture and the lifeline of food production. However, in many regions, the availability of diverse, traditional, and locally adapted seeds is diminishing. The consequences of relying solely on commercial seeds can be detrimental to farmers. Community local seed banks play a vital role in preserving and promoting indigenous seed varieties, ensuring their availability, and supporting smallholder farmers to maintain food sovereignty.

Through this project intervention the community seed banks will capacitate farmers to right owners, access seeds and grow crops during the next growing season or they can be used as an emergency seed supply during crop failure or when crops are damaged by pests, diseases, flooding, drought, or other natural calamities.

IFTz, a non-profit organization committed to sustainable agriculture development, believes that

empowering local communities is the key to achieving food security, promote food nutrition, poverty alleviation, and environmental sustainability and eventually becomes prosperous and influential. With the establishment of the community seed banks in Waida and Daki villages of Chemba District, IFTz envisions a future where farmers have access to a wide range of locally well adapted seed varieties, fostering crop diversity, and enhancing resilience to climate change. The project target to reach a total of 200 Smallholder farmers (113 women and 91 men) direct beneficiaries and indirect beneficiaries will be 1,196 community members (683 female and 513 male).

The success of this pilot project relies on collaboration and support from various stakeholders.

IFTz invites individuals, organizations, and stakeholders passionate about sustainable agriculture, agroecology, and community development to join hands with us and support this transformative and inspiring initiative in the following ways:

- Investing in the local seed banks will ensure its sustainability, expansion and readily availability of once endangered seed varieties.

Enhancing Community Livelihoods through Donkey Welfare

WITH FINANCIAL and technical support from Brooke East Africa, IFTz is embarking on a one-year project in Singida, Iringa, and Dodoma regions of Tanzania.

The IFTz Managing Director Mbarwa Kivuyo told the Livelihoods Herald that the initiative is focusing on promoting donkey welfare, adding that "this initiative aims to empower local communities and uplift their livelihoods." Kivuyo added: "By recognizing the immense contributions of donkeys to rural economies, IFTz strives to create sustainable and compassionate practices that benefit both animals and humans alike."

Donkeys have long been invaluable companions to rural communities worldwide. In Tanzania, these humble

animals have played a crucial role in supporting livelihoods, serving as reliable means of transportation, hauling agricultural produce, and aiding in various rural activities. Unfortunately, donkeys often face neglect, abuse, and poor welfare conditions due to a lack of awareness and resources.

The IFTz one-year project renewable annually, seeks to tackle these challenges promoting donkey welfare at the community level. By providing education, training, and resources, the project aims to raise awareness about the importance of treating donkeys with care and respect. Through targeted workshops and awareness campaigns, community

members will be empowered with knowledge about proper donkey management, nutrition, health care, and appropriate harnessing techniques.

To ensure the success and sustainability of the project, IFTz will conduct comprehensive capacity-building programs. Local communities will receive training on various aspects related to donkey welfare, including animal husbandry, handling techniques, and the implementation of sustainable practices. These efforts will empower community members to become advocates for donkey welfare, leading to long-term positive change.

In addition to enhancing donkey welfare, the project aims to enhance community livelihoods through income generation activities. IFTz will provide support and resources for the establishment of donkey-related enterprises such as transportation services, donkey milk production, and the production of donkey-derived

products like soap and leather goods.

By diversifying income streams and creating

entrepreneurial opportunities, the project aims to reduce poverty and enhance economic resilience within these communities.

IFTz recognizes that long-term success relies on collaboration and sustainability. The organization will actively engage with local stakeholders, including community leaders, veterinary experts, and government agencies, to ensure the project's sustainability.
